Preparing the Next Generation of Health Professionals







The Healthy People Curriculum Task Force, convened by the Association of Teachers of Preventive Medicine and the Association of Academic Health Centers, aims to accomplish the *Healthy People 2010* goal of increasing the prevention content of clinical health professions education. It has developed a Clinical Prevention and Population Health Curriculum Framework as a structure to do so, emphasizing both individual- and population-oriented prevention efforts.

At the 12th Congress of Health Professions Educators, we will examine the underpinnings, scope, implementation, and implications of this curriculum framework. Nationally renowned experts will consider the nature and breadth of the four components of the curriculum framework: evidence base for practice, clinical preventive services-health promotion, health systems and health policy, and community aspects of practice. Others will share pilot programs that are implementing the framework. We will also hear, based on the work of two national preventive services task forces, how to translate evidence into practice. Conference attendees should depart with knowledge of a foundation for a prevention curriculum that may be implemented widely.

The annual Congress of Health Professions Educators, a program of the Association of Academic Health Centers' Center for Interprofessional, Community-based Learning, provides a vibrant forum for the exchange of ideas across the health disciplines and promotes a collaborative vision for the future. It convenes current and prospective leaders from all levels of the academic health center and partnering institutions. The Association of Academic Health Centers is especially pleased to co-sponsor the 12th Congress of Health Professions Educators with the Association of Teachers of Preventive Medicine, the national association supporting health promotion and disease prevention educators and researchers. Its members include individual clinicians, public health professionals, and health services researchers, as well as institutional members, including academic departments and programs, health agencies, and schools of public health.

The Association of Academic Health Centers is extremely grateful to The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation for its generous support of the 12th Congress.
